COMMISSION DECISION

C(2008)8393 of 18/12/2008

adopting the Multi-Beneficiary Programme 2b, for projects requiring a Financing Agreement under the IPA Transition Assistance and Institution Building Component

THE COMMISSION OF THE EUROPEAN COMMUNITIES,

Having regard to the Treaty establishing the European Community,

Having regard to Council Regulation (EC) No 1085/2006 of 17 July 2006 establishing an Instrument for Pre-Accession Assistance (IPA)¹, and in particular Article 14(2)(a) thereof,

Whereas:

- (1) Regulation (EC) No 1085/2006 lays down the objectives and main principles for pre-accession assistance to candidates and potential candidates.
- (2) In accordance with Article 7 of Regulation (EC) No 1085/2006, the assistance should be provided through multi-annual or annual programmes, which can be established by country and by component, or, as appropriate, by group of countries or by theme. These programmes should be drawn up in accordance with the general policy framework referred to in Article 4 of Regulation (EC) No 1085/2006 and the relevant multi-annual indicative planning document referred to in Article 6 of that Regulation.
- (3) The Council established for all candidates and potential candidates a European or Accession Partnership. The Commission has adopted on 17 July 2008 a Multi-Beneficiary Multi-annual Indicative Planning Document 2008 -2010 which presents indicative allocations for the main priorities for pre-accession assistance to the countries concerned².
- (4) Therefore, the Multi-Beneficiary Financing Proposal 2b, for projects requiring a Financing Agreement, under the IPA Transition Assistance and Institution Building Component for 2008 aims at providing assistance to:
 - i. Improve and promote strategic and operational regional and international capacities within the region and between the region and the EU to fight against organised crime, in particular illicit drug trafficking, and to prevent terrorism;
 - ii. Improve the Southeast European Cooperative Initiative (SECI) Centre's / SELEC³ capacity to fight against organised crime, in line with EU acquis and best practices;
 - iii. Contribute to an area of cooperation in the field of higher education involving the European Union and Beneficiaries in the surrounding area;
 - iv. Provide support to improve regional and cross-border cooperation in the Western Balkans and thereby ensure that the control and eradication of

important animal diseases is harmonised and coordinated at a regional level with Commission support.

- (5) This decision meets the requirements of Article 90 of Commission Regulation (EC, Euratom) No 2342/2002 of 23 December 2002 laying down detailed rules for the implementation of Council Regulation No 1605/2002⁴ (hereafter: "Implementing Rules") and constitutes thus a financing decision within the meaning of Article 75 of Council Regulation (EC, Euratom) No 1605/2002 of 25 June 2002 on the Financial Regulation applicable to the general budget of the European Communities⁵ (hereafter: "Financial Regulation").
- (6) The measures provided for by this Decision are in accordance with the opinion of the IPA Committee⁶,

HAS DECIDED AS FOLLOWS:

Article 1

The Multi-Beneficiary Programme 2b, for projects requiring a Financing Agreement, under the IPA Transition Assistance and Institution Building Component for 2008, as set out in the Annex, is hereby adopted.

This programme shall be implemented by centralised management.

The programme is implemented with Financing Agreements.

Article2

The maximum amount of Community contribution shall be **EUR 24.7 million**, to be financed through Item 22.02 07 01 of the general budget of the European Communities for 2008.

This Multi-beneficiary IPA Programme is designed to respond to Multi-beneficiary priority needs as indicated in the Multi-beneficiary Multi-annual Indicative Planning Document (MIPD) 2008-2010 taking into account activities implemented under the National Programmes, the guidance provided in the EU strategic documents, the lessons learned from the programming and implementation of previous EU assistance and the findings from consultations with amongst others, the Beneficiaries, International Financial Institutions, the Stability Pact, the Regional Cooperation Council, the EU Member State Regional Contact Points, Civil Society Organisations and European Commission services.

To facilitate programming, the Multi-beneficiary IPA 2008 projects have been consolidated into a series of separate Programmes. The Commission Decisions⁴ pertaining to the Multi-

beneficiary Financing Proposal (Programme) 1 (supporting Refugee Return in the Western Balkans, Disaster Risk Reduction in South East Europe and the Regional School for Public Administration), the Energy Community, Monitoring, the Regional Cooperation Council, the Office of the High Representative (OHR) in Bosnia and Herzegovina and Civil Society Dialogue and Development have been adopted. The Commission Decisions regarding Nuclear Safety and Radiation Protection and Cooperation with International Financial Institutions should be adopted later this year.

The Multi-beneficiary Programme 2 is presented in two parts – a and b. 2. c Overview of past and on going assistance (EU / IFI / Bilateral and national assistance) including lessons learned and donor coordination

Past and ongoing assistance

From 2000 to 2007, over EUR 657 million has been provided in assistance to candidates and potential candidates through the CARDS Regional, Phare Multi-Country and IPA Multi-beneficiary programmes. In financial terms, assistance provided under these programmes has addressed, in particular, socio-economic development through extensive and close collaboration with International Financial Institutions, which have helped the development of a functioning financial sector capable of supporting the expansion of the private sector and the needs of municipalities.

Equally important is the support that has been given to the regional cooperation process in the Western Balkans and certain areas of key importance for the European integration, such as tax and customs, statistics, public administration (SIGMA) and horizontal support via TAIEX. Additional details on the assistance allocated under the CARDS, Phare and IPA programmes are provided in the table below:

Lessons learned

In designing the Multi-beneficiary IPA 2008 programme, particular note has been taken of the results of projects programmed in previous years. The lessons learned build upon the experience in the implementation of previous projects in the specific areas. The pertinent information at a project level is provided in the annexed project fiches.

In the management of previous and ongoing Multi-beneficiary IPA, CARDS Regional and Phare Multi-Country projects and programmes a number of applicable lessons have emerged

Note: The CARDS figures indicated include assistance from Phare and Obnova where relevant in 2000 and from CARDS 2001 and onwards. In 2005 and 2006, the amounts indicated for Phare include those allocated to multi-country programmes from the Turkey pre-accession instrument. The CARDS Regional Programmes of 2004, 2005 and 2006 include respectively €15m, €15m and €11.9m for Cross-Border Cooperation.

through the project monitoring and evaluation reports as well as the evaluation report on the implementation of CARDS assistance to the Western Balkans which are applicable to this programme. These include:

- Programme Coordination: Beneficiaries have emphasized the importance of regular and timely communications regarding the Financing Proposals to facilitate their involvement and ownership of the programme. Consequently, detailed programme plans, which include timelines and the process for the distribution of draft documents for comment have been drafted, discussed and communicated to the Beneficiaries Multibeneficiary coordination meetings which take place regularly throughout the year allow for discussion on the status of programming and project implementation.
- *Donor Coordination:* In light of the number of players involved in the area donor coordination is a notable challenge which must continue to be addressed;
- *Complementarities:* EU Multi-beneficiary assistance must complement and be consistent with the National programmes;
- Local Ownership: Increasing local ownership is essential for the effective targeting of the support and achieving the agreed results. Significant efforts are being made to involve the Beneficiaries, the Stability Pact and the Regional Cooperation Council;
- Absorption Capacity: The absorption capacity and past achievement record of Beneficiary organisations is an important consideration.

Donor Coordination

Coordination and coherence of assistance and activities is particularly important, given the large number of players involved. The need for improved coordination and coherence has been highlighted to the Commission during consultations as a continuing concern by the authorities of the region.

Efforts are being made by DG Enlargement to improve coordination in this area. Regular meetings are organised throughout the year for example, with Beneficiaries, Delegations and stakeholders (including for example an International Financial Institutions (IFI) days, Donor Coordination days).

The Commission has endeavoured to establish a transparent consultation process with in particular the Beneficiaries. This process is aimed at enhancing, as far as possible, local ownership of the choices, content and design of the programmes. Consultations take place at a regular interval during the programming phase with the Beneficiaries and other stakeholders. Special importance should be given to the role of the Regional Cooperation Council as the interlocutor for the Beneficiaries in particular for the Regional Cooperation Process in the Western Balkans. Other coordination activities include:

- European Commission has played an active role in the Stability Pact for South East Europe and as mentioned above, close collaboration will be ensured with its successor organisation, the Regional Cooperation Council;
- European Commission maintains bilateral relations with governments to ensure their actions complement and build on national efforts;

- European Commission Delegations and the European Agency for Reconstruction (EAR) as appropriate organise regular meetings between Member States, Beneficiaries and other involved organisations (such as IFIs) to ensure monitoring and coordination throughout the programming cycle;
- DG Enlargement staff responsible for the implementation of the Multi-beneficiary programmes participate in regional networks and structures to facilitate coordination amongst the stakeholders and donors active in the region.

2. d Horizontal issues

Cross cutting issues, such as equal opportunities, support to minorities and vulnerable groups, environmental protection and good governance, have, as appropriate, become an integral part of each project fiche. The mainstreaming of the cross cutting issues in each project shall ensure that strategies, policies, structures and operating procedures of the Beneficiary are in conformity with the principles defined in the various project fiches.

2. e Conditions

Overall, there should be a continued clear consensus by the Beneficiaries as well as in the region to support the initiatives pertaining to this Financing Decision. Details on the conditions that need to be fulfilled by the Beneficiaries prior to the implementation of specific projects are included in the annexed project fiches.

3.2 Principle of Co-Financing applying to the projects funded under the programme

The Community contribution which represents up to 96% of the total budget allocated to this programme has been calculated in relation to the eligible expenditure which in the case of centralised management is based on total expenditure. Parallel co-financing will be used.

Due to its regional character it is not possible to require national co-financing for the projects in this Programme.

The total EC contribution to the implementation of the 2008 Tempus Programme in the Western Balkans will amount to EUR 19,700,000.00. The funded consortia will need to make available a co-funding of up to 5%.

In the case of grants, final grant beneficiaries should contribute with a minimum of 10 % of the eligible expenditure of the project.

4. IMPLEMENTATION ARRANGEMENTS

4.1 Method of implementation

The programme will be implemented on a centralised basis by the European Commission in accordance with Article 53a of the Financial Regulation⁸ and the corresponding provisions of the Implementing Rules⁹. Exceptions to this method of implementation are identified below:

(1) Education – Tempus

The **Tempus** programme will be implemented on an indirect centralised basis by the European Commission following Article 53a of the Financial Regulation and corresponding provisions of the Implementing Rules. Implementation tasks are delegated under Article 54.2 (a) of the Financial Regulation to the Executive Agency for Education, Audiovisual and Culture, which was created by Commission Decision 2005/56/EC of 14 January 2005. According to Article 12 (3) of the Council Regulation No (EC) 58/2003 of 19 December 2002 laying down the statute for executive agencies to be entrusted with certain tasks in the management of Community programmes, any programme delegated to an executive agency has to contribute to the financing of the administrative budget of the agency.

Due to the nature of implementation, the administrative expenditure associated with operational appropriations in any given year is incurred in the following year. Hence the provision of management costs has been envisaged in 2008 to cover the administrative expenditure for the programmes planned under the 2007 budget (not included in the present Financing Proposal).

(2) Animal Disease Eradication

The **animal disease eradication** project will be implemented by the European Commission with sub-delegation to DG Health and Consumers.

4.2 General rules for procurement and grant award procedures

Procurement shall follow the provisions of Part Two, Title IV of the Financial Regulation and Part Two, Title III, Chapter 3 of its Implementing Rules as well as the rules and procedures for service, supply and works contracts financed from the general budget of the European Communities for the purposes of cooperation with third countries adopted by the Commission on 24 May 2007 (C(2007)2034).

Grant award procedures shall follow the provisions of Part One, Title VI of the Financial Regulation and Part One, Title VI of its Implementing Rules.

The Commission shall also use the procedural guidelines and standard templates and models facilitating the application of the above rules provided for in the "<u>Practical Guide to contract procedures for EC external actions</u>" ("Practical Guide") as published on the EuropeAid website¹⁰ at the date of initiation of the procurement or grant award procedure.

5. MONITORING AND EVALUATION

5.1 Monitoring

The Commission may undertake any actions it deems necessary to monitor the programmes concerned.

5.2 Evaluation

Programmes shall be subject to ex ante evaluations, as well as interim and, where relevant, ex post evaluations in accordance with Articles 57 and 82 of IPA Implementing Regulation, with the aim of improving the quality, effectiveness and consistency of the assistance from Community funds and the strategy and implementation of the programmes.

The results of ex ante and interim evaluation shall be taken into account in the programming and implementation cycle.

The Commission may also carry out strategic evaluations.

6. AUDIT, FINANCIAL CONTROL AND ANTI-FRAUD MEASURES

The accounts and operations of all parties involved in the implementation of this programme, as well as all contracts and agreements implementing this programme, are subject to, on the one hand, the supervision and financial control by the Commission (including the European Anti-Fraud Office), which may carry out checks at its discretion, either by itself or through an outside auditor and, on the other hand, audits by the European Court of Auditors. This includes measures such as ex-ante verification of tendering and contracting carried out by the Delegation in the Beneficiaries.

In order to ensure the efficient protection of the financial interests of the Community, the Commission (including the European Anti-Fraud Office) may conduct on-the-spot checks and

inspections in accordance with the procedures foreseen in Council Regulation (EC, Euratom) 2185/96¹¹.

The controls and audits described above are applicable to all contractors, subcontractors and grant beneficiaries who have received Community funds.

7. LIMITED CHANGES

Limited changes in the implementation of this programme affecting essential elements listed under Article 90 of the Implementing Rules to the Financial Regulation, which are of an indicative nature¹², may be undertaken by the authorising officer by delegation (AOD), or by the authorising officer by sub-delegation (AOSD), in line with the delegation of powers conferred upon him by the AOD, in accordance with the principles of sound financial management without an amending financing decision being necessary.

These essential elements of an indicative nature are, for grants, the indicative amount of the call for proposals and, for procurement, the indicative number and type of contracts envisaged and the indicative time frame for launching the procurement procedures.
