Growth Plan for the Western Balkans

In 2023, the EU announced a landmark **Growth Plan** to accelerate Western Balkans partners' socio-economic development and EU integration.

The Plan aims to boost **socio-economic convergence** through enhanced economic integration with the **EU's single market**, regional integration within the **Common Regional Market**, accelerating fundamental reforms.

As part of this Growth Plan, Kosovo was invited to prepare a **Reform Agenda** focusing on reforms to **unlock national and regional growth potential** and related to the fundamentals of the enlargement process, including **the rule of law, democracy, the respect of human rights and fundamental freedoms**.

A €6 billion Reform and Growth Facility for the Western Balkans will support implementation of the Growth Plan. The Commission approved the Reform Agenda of Kosovo in October 2024. €882 million in non-repayable grants and favourable loans will be available to Kosovo when it meets the conditions it has committed to in its own Reform Agenda.

A specific pre-condition applies to Kosovo and Serbia who must engage constructively in the normalisation of their relations.

 largest provider of financial assistance The EU is the largest provider of financial assistance to Kosovo. It offers a variety of programmes and instruments to support Kosovo's development and alignment with EU acquis and norms.

Instrument for Pre-Accession (IPA)

Between 2021-2024 the EU has allocated over €245.8 million in non-repayable grants to Kosovo under IPA III. These funds support fundamental reforms, socio-economic development and meeting the EU standards and norms.

This includes:

- €75 million Energy Support Package in 2023, which has supported private sector and vulnerable families in Kosovo against rising energy prices and enhanced the energy security and green transition.
- €21.3 million EU approximation facility to support Kosovo's accession perspective, including for the Belgrade-Pristina Dialogue.
- €53 million EU for Environment programme focused on improving the wastewater and solid waste management systems.

Economic & Investment Plan (EIP)

The EU's **EIP for the Western Balkans** identifies 10 flagship investment priorities for the region to spur long-term growth, accelerate green & digital transitions, and foster regional cooperation.

For projects in **Kosovo**, since 2020, the EU has already mobilised **€893 million in investments thanks to €303 million in EU grants**. Funds are raised through tools such as the Western Balkans Investment Framework (WBIF). This includes:

- EU contribution of €55 million for installing a photovoltaic plant of up to 100 MW and introducing solar energy in the district heating network of Pristina.
- Construction of a wastewater treatment facility in Mitrovica and rehabilitation of the sewerage network serving 123 000 people.

The EU is Kosovo's main trading partner. In 2023, the EU accounted for 41.1% of Kosovo's total trade in goods (31.7% of total exports and 42.5% of total imports). Total EU Foreign Direct Investment reached €388.9 million in 2022*.

Progressive trade liberalisation and mutual duty-free access for most goods has been taking place since 2006 and is currently based on the **EU – Kosovo Stabilisation and Association Agreement** (SAA).









Foreign & security policy cooperation

- Kosovo continues to condemn Russia's unjustified and unprovoked military aggression against Ukraine and to implement restrictive measures against Russia and Belarus.
- The government allocated €100 000 in humanitarian aid and dedicated funds to shelter 20 journalists from Ukraine.
 Recently, Kosovo announced its first military aid packages for Ukraine.
- Since 2008, the European Union Rule of Law Mission in Kosovo (EULEX) has been assisting Kosovo authorities in setting up sustainable and independent institutions.

People to people contacts

- Since 1 January 2024, Kosovars benefit from visa-free travel to the EU.
- The EU has funded over 11 500 exchanges between EU and Kosovo citizens in the areas of education, training, youth, and sport under ERASMUS+ (2014-2020).
