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Mr. Dragan Mugosa, Information Officer Dragan.Mugosa@ear.europa.eu The lack of equal opportunities is one of the most serious issues not only in the Montenegrin education system but also in many other countries in the Western Balkans. According to the Poverty Reduction Strategy Paper, the main problem areas in Montenegro are health, social care, regional development, ecology, education and employment. A Second Chance is an EU-funded NGO project helping the Montenegrin civil society address two of these main problems: education and employment.

The Roma, Ashkaelia and Egyptians in Montenegro are extremely poorly educated. The functional illiteracy rate among these groups is estimated to be around 70%. This is partly due to inadequate structures in society and partly to traditions of lifestyle and culture. This EU-funded project provides literacy and vocational training courses that enable young illiterate adults to acquire basic skills like reading, writing, arithmetic and other capabilities that are necessary to become an active part of the labor market and society. Thus, the project contributes to the better social and economic integration of the ethnic minorities in Montenegro.

The project is undertaking around 30 various activites to achive its ambitions. Among others, this includes the organisation of five literacy courses, vocational courses for ten different occupations, assistance in obtaining a driving license or IT skills, depending on interest and ability. The project plans to do a follow-up that will help participants integrate into the labour market.
